

We are focused on making Alabama's water clean. Our future with CRYSTAL CLEAN WATER is possible, but we must all work together!



Storm Water Pollution

Storms across Alabama are pouring millions of gallons of rain water that then flows off of parking lots, buildings, roads, and homes. This fast-moving water is not being absorbed into the ground, but instead empties into our streams, rivers, and eventually into Mobile Bay and then into the Gulf of Mexico. The raging water then washes not only the topsoil off the land, but also fertilizers and pesticides. This polluted water pours into the curbs and overflows the storm water pipes, and often flows into city sewage pipes. This can lead to Sanitary Sewage Overflow (SSO) which release harmful sewage into our waterways and bay. This water is undrinkable and is toxic to the plants, animals, birds, and fish that are so abundant in our state.

Mobile Bay and the sky above it, and the surrounding land and beaches are abundant with millions of plants and animals and fish. When a Jubilee comes to the Eastern Shore crabs and shrimp can be caught by hand. There'll be flounders too. A flounder has both eyes on one side. This must make it easier for him to see his mullet friends that are always jumping out of the water. If you watch from the shore you'll see many pelicans flying low in search of their dinner. On the beach and swimming near the shore you'll see ducks and geese. The geese are beautiful and fun to watch, but they sure dirty the beach with their waste! If you are quiet you may even observe the long-legged heron and its close relative the egret standing among the tall grasses. Our beaches have beautiful longleaf pine trees full of curious squirrels.







Activities

Alabama beaches are a wonderful place to spend a sunny afternoon. Families can have a picnic under the cool shade of a Virginia Pine tree. After eating, blankets and lawn chairs pop up on the sand near the water where kids can build sand castles and collect shells and driftwood. The adults sunbathe and read. Teenagers can often be seen playing volleyball or soccer. Visitors stroll along the water's edge often picking up litter and then throwing it in the garbage or recycling cans. The piers are busy mornings, afternoons, and evenings with tourists walking and locals throwing cast nets to catch bait fish. If the wind is blowing, the sailboats will be skipping across the bay, but when the wind calms down the paddleboards and kayaks dot the water.
